The High Sky Wing will be hosting a fly-in breakfast in the Commemorative Center hangar and CAF ramp on Saturday, September 12th starting at 8:00 a.m. and running until noon. The event will help publicize the HSW and our rides program to the local aviation community. We are negotiating with a local mobile breakfast wagon to provide the food for fly-ins, members and visitors.

In addition to rides for sale all day, plus rides gift

certificates for sale, those who fly-in will receive a free breakfast and a coupon for 1/2 off the admission to the CAF Airpower Museum that day. Other attractions will be cockpit tours of the HSW planes plus tours of the B-29 FIFI. We will also have information tables set up in the hangar with membership brochures for the CAF, HSW and Museum, plus AIRSHO 2009 posters and tickets for sale. We hope to have AIRSHO T-shirts and other items for sale, too.

We will be gearing up for this event starting next week and will have more details at the Wing meeting and in email updates and the next newsletter. Plan to come out to help us put on one of the best fly-ins in West Texas!

The High Sky Wing's financial status continues to rocket Sky High. Bingo made another \$6000 donation this month, and the aircraft rides program continues to grow as our marketing and exposure mature. Over the last year we have sold \$3145.09 in rides. That is 75% of our maintenance for the same period. I expect the aircraft to begin to be self sufficient for maintenance in the near future.

I don't believe I've mentioned those that have come forward with the **Paid The Rent** donations in a while. Thanks to Randy Wilson, Deb Magness, Gary Covington, Mary Alice Tidwell, Blake Cowart, and Ed McElrath. Each of these members have put up \$500.00 toward the monthly rent.

New Aircraft Opportunities!

Some of you may have heard that there has been interest expressed within our Wing in attempting to acquire a Stearman, a two-place, open-cockpit biplane that was one of the most used World War II primary trainers in both the Army Air Corps and Navy. In that regard, several members were working as an exploratory group to test the financial feasibility of the Wing buying a Stearman, donating it to the CAF, and then having it assigned to the HSW. From the work done so far, it seems there is a strong interest in attempting to acquire a Stearman and many have already expressed a desire to pledge funds in support.

While evaluating whether the efforts to purchase a Stearman should become more official, the Wing staff has learned of two airplanes that have become available for assignment within the CAF and which may present an exciting opportunity for the Wing. One is a Stearman PT-17 that is being turned in for re-assignment because of lack of use (the unit had two Stearmans). The other is the North American T-28A which you may have noticed in our hangar at the last Wing meeting.

At the Wing staff meeting last Tuesday night, it was discussed that it may be possible for the Wing to acquire both of these planes for a similar financial commitment as it might take to buy a Stearman, since they are already part of the CAF Ghost Squadron fleet of planes. The Wing staff discussed many reasons that these planes would make great additions to the Wing including increasing member interest and recruiting possibilities and benefiting the Rides for Hire program. The Wing staff voted to form a committee of Gena Linebarger, Mike Hedrick, Sam Strahan, and Chris Aycock to develop a specific business plan and complete the necessary application papers required by headquarters. The purpose of this committee is to

provide information to the Wing staff so that they can decide whether the Wing should pursue assignment of both of these planes. We are aware that other CAF units are planning on requesting assignments of these aircraft.

The basic application process does not obligate the Wing to accept the assignment if it is offered nor does it guarantee that we will be offered either or both of the planes. If you expressed an interest in making a financial contribution towards the purchase of a Stearman, you will be contacted by one of the committee members to inquire whether you would still be interested in making that contribution, if those funds could be used either for the Stearman, the T-28, or both, and if you want them to be Aircraft Sponsorships or donations directly to the High Sky Wing.

A very important part of the application process for the assignment of any CAF aircraft is the number of individual Aircraft Sponsors that are willing to put up a Flying Sponsorship, a Maintenance Sponsorship or a Supporting Sponsorship. CAF Aircraft sponsorships are a one-time donation for a specific aircraft and the funds are placed in that aircraft's account at CAF HQ and can be used for any maintenance or restoration costs on that aircraft. Here are the costs of these different sponsorship levels for the two aircraft:

For the Stearman PT-17

Aircraft/Pilot Sponsor - \$1500

Maintenance/Restoration Sponsor - \$750

Supporting Sponsor - \$150

For the North American T-28A

Aircraft/Pilot Sponsor - \$3500

Maintenance/Restoration Sponsor - \$1750

Supporting Sponsor - \$350

If you would like to donate a lesser amount or would rather donate money directly to the High Sky Wing to help obtain these aircraft and not go the sponsor route, the Wing can also put up Aircraft Sponsorships in its own name. Again, a member of the committee will be in touch with you over the next couple of weeks but if you want to express support, financial or otherwise, or if you have concerns, please contact one of the committee members and share your thoughts. As always, you can also contact me, if needed. This may be a great opportunity for the Wing, and the Wing staff is looking forward to hearing the results of the committee's work. See you July 23rd at the Wing meeting where we hope to have more information to share on this.

The Most Important Unit in the CAF

I hope the title of this little piece caught your attention, because, as High Sky Wing members, we don't often think of ourselves in those terms. Yet the fact is we are, indeed, the most important Wing, not because we are the biggest unit, or have the largest bank account, or operate the marquee airplanes. The Arizona Wing has the largest membership in the CAF; we are eighth. The Arizona Wing, SoCal Wing, and Dixie Wing all have assets of more than seven figures; the High Sky Wing didn't even rank in the top twenty of all CAF units in financial strength. The SoCal Wing, with its collection of our fighters, operates the most CAF airplanes, while we operate only four. So, why is it that I say we are the most important Wing?

Because we must be.

Elsewhere in this newsletter Randy and the other staff members will be addressing several new initiatives the Wing is undertaking. I applaud those efforts enthusiastically and am fully committed to use whatever influence I have as Chief of Staff to accomplish them. However, success rests more in your hands than in mine. Please read on.

We are the most important Wing in the CAF because we are the face of the entire organization. Our

location makes this so. CAF Headquarters is just a place: WE are the people. It is the HSW that is identified with the annual AIRSHO, it is the HSW that supports the various functions at HQ and at the museum, and it is the HSW that occupies the Commemorative Center. Rightly or wrongly, the perception of the CAF as a successful dynamic organization, both within the rest of the CAF and with the public in general, rests with us. If we begin to fail, if we don't see the value in the mission of the CAF, if we aren't doing all we can to complete that mission, then the CAF will fail, first in Midland, Texas and then across the country. If we are an irrelevant organization, with a shrinking membership, lacking any sense of mission, then we will cease to exist.

Steve Brown was hired to bail out a leaky vessel. The CAF was operating with a yearly deficit of SIX HUNDRED THOUSAND dollars. Drastic measures had to be taken, and more need to be, before the CAF can be considered on a sound financial footing. The CAF needs to operate as a business instead of a flying club, and it needs to create a business model that will mesh volunteers with paid professionals all pulling together to achieve a worthwhile mission. Steve is working on the business model, while I'm trying to get the General Staff to define the mission, one that captures the loftiest sentiments of honor, remembrance, loyalty, and patriotism. Neither is an easy task.

This leads me to the Commemorative Center. For more than six years that building consumed a huge amount of my time and effort. I suffered through many disappointments and mistakes, and I had to make many more compromises than I ever wanted, just to get the building built, and I was not alone in that endeavor. The finished product is not perfect. But, it is now our home. We voted overwhelmingly to move there, we invested thousands of dollars to make it "home," and it is a first-class facility. Whatever difficulties we had, have, or will have in the future, in meshing our operations with rental events, museum activities, or anything else, must be worked out. For, if we can't work these things out, then the CAF's presence here will become increasingly problematic. Simple economics will force the CAF to look for a place with a larger population/tourism base.

The CAF moved to Midland Texas because Joe Mabee mobilized both his own resources and those of the Permian Basin to demonstrate to the General Staff that Midland could and would support the CAF. Each

of us is smart enough to realize that Midland is not a tourist stop, and so the business decision, to locate something that is tourism-dependent, in the wilds of West Texas, was made because of that promised support. More than ONE THOUSAND new LOCAL members joined the CAF in 1990-91 as a way to demonstrate that support. Several million dollars were raised and buildings built. The future appeared rosy. Now, almost twenty years later, it is not. Support from the community for the CAF is waning. Local government support has weakened. And those more than one thousand members...where are those members now? And how can this situation be reversed?

I hope that you are looking in the mirror for the answer.

Do I expect the High Sky Wing to come up with the millions of dollars to match those that Joe Mabee poured into the CAF to bring it to Midland? Or do I expect the High Sky Wing to influence government leaders to do more for our operation in Midland? As much as I would like to say "yes," the reality of the situation is that we can't. What we can do, and must do, is increase our membership and be as supportive as we possibly can be with everything being done by HQ and by the Museum. It is imperative to our own self-interest that we do so. IF we were the largest unit within the CAF (and all that would take would be to double our existing membership: who have you recruited?), We would represent a power base that would wield significant influence. IF we eagerly offered even more of our support for AIRSHO, for the museum's events, for the Cadet program, even for helping with the rentals events held in our "own" building, that sense of dynamism and commitment to the mission of the CAF would increase.

But what if we don't? What if we allow small things to distract, unintentional snubs and slights to grow and fester, simple courtesies to be rejected, and valid thoughts and opinions to be rejected out of hand? What if we say "That's HQ's problem/mess/issue, so let them deal with it." How long can economic realities be ignored before harsh measures are taken? The future for us then, my friends, becomes very bleak.

Is the CAF going to move in the near future? No. Does Steve Brown want to move the CAF from Midland to an area with more potential? No. But the economic realities can not be ignored forever. We are not in a crisis now, but we need to be as proactive as we possibly can to prevent that crisis from coming. More

than anything else I want to see the CAF and the HSW flourish. Much of my life has been tied up with this organization. It has to succeed, and it has to succeed HERE. That is why we are “the most important unit in the CAF.”
