LOOSE FORMATION: WING LEADER REPORT BY MIKE HEDRICK



Can you feel it? Do you have a sense that something is happening? Our world is changing... and accelerating the rate of change... what do we do to keep up?

The High Sky Wing and the CAF occupy an interesting place in the world. We are an educational organization that teaches history by maintaining and operating obsolete flying machines. These flying machines were designed and built at a time when there had to be a direct mechanical or hydraulic connection between the pilot and the engine and control surfaces. There were no electronic navigation systems, and many flew out of grass airstrips and

into unknown weather conditions... with skill...and on a wing and a prayer.

The HSW flying machines are the same now as then. We actually go to great pains to keep them that way. Modern restorations of WWII military aircraft go so far as to duplicate the haphazard painting of interior panels that characterized the mass produced emergency war machine. What is different is the supply of warbirds. We can no longer take one up and wear it out practicing, or limp home from a brutal combat mission, and pull a new one out of the parking lot for tomorrow's mission. We are in permanent preservation mode.

So how is our world changing? As the HSW grows its fleet, and moves to bigger, more complex machines, the changes are coming from operational logistics. Today, because of a vast array of issues like

governmental regulation, insurance and legal compliance, availability of fuel and parts, and competition for the time, money and attention of volunteers and charitable organizations, we are in a period analogous to Moore's Law of the computing world: the complexity of operations is doubling every couple of years.

As we enter the 2012 flying season, the Wing will be wrestling with the usual issues common to keeping old airplanes flying, and with new events that will require our ability to understand and adapt. This spring will be challenging with the closure of our taxiway for repaving, potentially curtailing HSW attendance at out of town airshows. Innovative fund raising will be a priority as we move the *T-28* project to completion and operational status. (*see Hedrick*, *page two*)

AIRCRAFT EMERGENCY SAFETY

Just the other day, I had an opportunity to ride in a DPS helicopter for a funeral flyover and be the contact person to let our guys follow us with the CAF flyover of the grave site service. The ride was an experience to remember.

Now, let's talk about safety. During a preflight check on the helicopter ride, the pilot gave me a detailed briefing on the standard emergency procedures during flight or a crash landing. He showed me how to escape if something happens. Thinking about that made me realize we as pilots or crew members need to know our standard emergency procedures and need to brief our passengers, whether they are new members or experienced riders, on how to exit the planes in case of emergency, and on any other emergency procedures.

With the onset of warm weather, we need to be aware of our

surroundings. It is time for the critters, spiders, snakes, etc. to be coming out of hiding, SO WATCH YOUR STEP!



Snake Bite Statistics

- About 7,000 people are bitten by venomous snakes in the U.S. annually.
- Only 0.2% (1 out of 500) venomous snake bites result in death
- On average, 1 to 2 people in Texas die each year from venomous snake bites in Texas.
- Roughly half of all venomous snake bites are "dry." That is, the snake does not inject venom into the victim.

ADJUTANT REPORT BY PATTI COLLINS





On March 4, 1944 the USAAF launched and then cancelled the first daylight bomber raid on Berlin. Twenty-nine of the aircraft launched did not receive the cancellation and carried out their original orders. Two days later, 730 bombers and 796 fighters flew against Berlin, commencing a series of air attacks against the German capital.
